The 31st International Congress of Human Sciences in Asia and North Africa will be held at Toshi Center Hall and Zenkyoren Bldg., etc. in Tokyo from 31 August to 3 Septemer, and at Kyoto International Conference Hall from 5 to 7 September, 1983.  - 5. Religious Movements in Islam, e.g. Umma Muhammadiya, Socio-religious Movements, Sufism, Salafiya
 - 6. Altaic Peoples History, Culture, and Language
 - 7. Cultural and Economic Relations between East and West Sea Routes and Land Routes
 - 8. Commercial Goods and Money in South Seas Trade in Recent Times (e.g. Trade in Gold, Silver, and Copper)
 - 9. Traditions of Science and Technology
 - 10. Literary Tradition and Its Transformation
 - 11. Relationships between Text and Object in Art (including Architecture and Crafts)
 - 12. Tradition and Intercultural Relations in Music, Dance and Theater
 - 13. Roles Played by Intellectuals in Law and Politics
 - 14. Economic Development and Culture Conflict

An abstract should be written in either English or French, but preferably the former. The Organizing Committee takes the responsibility of formulating the academic program including time to be allotted to speakers and the number of papers to be read.
