The Regional Centre for Strategic Studies

The (RCSS) is an independent, non-profit and non-governmental organization for collaborative research, networking and interaction on strategic and international issues pertaining to South Asia. All activities of RCSS are designed with a South Asia focus and are usually participated by experts from all countries of this region. The Centre is envisaged as a forum for advancing the cause of co-operation, security, conflict resolution, confidence building, peace and development in the South Asian region. It was set up in 1992, and is based in Colombo, Sri Lanka.

The work of the Centre is funded by voluntary contributions, grants, endowments, proceeds from funded projects, and income from sale of publications. The Ford Foundation, the Friedrich Naumann Stiftung, the Rockefeller Foundation, W. Alton Jones Foundation, the Asia Foundation, the Ploughshares Fund, the Merck Fund, the Japan Foundation Asia Center, the Independent Group on South Asian Cooperation (IGSAC), and Friedrich Ebert Stiftung have been the main sources of support as of July 1997.

Publications of the RCSS include books, a monthly press digest (which is brought out by the Bangladesh Institute of International and Strategic Studies in Dhaka: *Regional Press Digest on Nuclear Issue in South Asia*; also available on internet), the *RCSS Newsletter*, and *RCSS Policy Studies* (e.g., N. Wickramasinghe: *Humanitarian Relief Organisations and Challenges to Sovereignty: The Case of Sri Lanka*, Stephen P. Cohen: *The Structural Dimensions of Conflict in South Asia*, P.R. Chari: *Newer Sources of Insecurity: The Crisis of Governance in India*, B.S. Chimni: *The Law and Politics of Regional Solution of the Refugee Problem: The Case of South Asia*). In addition, the RCSS published a *Directory of individuals and institutions engaged in South Asian strategic studies*.

International Asian Studies Programme, Hong Kong

The International Asian Studies Programme (IASP) provides students and scholars the opportunity to live, study, and conduct research in a Chinese environment. The Programme is managed by the Office of international Studies Programmes (OISP), which is the coordinating center at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) for foreign students and scholars studying the Chinese language and Asian Studies.

IASP offers courses taught in English on aspects of Chinese civilization and culture, features of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region and international relations within the Asia-Pacific region. They are designed to meet the needs of students from a wide variety of backgrounds, ranging from beginner to specialist. Advanced students and researchers may take advantage of courses taught in Cantonese or Putonghua (Mandarin) and of research opportunities at CUHK and in Hong Kong.

IASP is open to qualified students of any nationality who have sufficient command of either Chinese or English to benefit from the Programme. Students who are not native speakers of English but intend to take English-taught courses at the University should have a minimum TOEFL score of 530. Applicants should currently be enrolled in or have graduated from an accredited college or university. No prior study of Chinese language or of Chinese or Asian studies is required, although many participants have background in these disciplines. IASP participants normally enroll for a full academic year (two terms).
