**Lin Yongsan (3)**

Appointed vice-minister of labor. (XNA, 19 May 95) He has served as vice-chairman of Inner Mongolia Regional People's Government since December 1991. He was named deputy head of the National Work Committee on Professional Classification and Qualifications which was set up on May 26, 1995. (XNA, 27 May 95) Lin was born in December 1939 in Linli County, Hu'nan Province, and joined the CCP in 1961. After graduating from the Automatic Control Department of Harbin Military Engineering Institute in 1966, he served as technician on probation at the No.1 Institute of the 7th Ministry of Machine-Building Industry, and technician of the Tianjin Jinhua Wireless Factory (1968-1978), engineer of the 8th Ministry of Machine-Building Industry, deputy division chief at the State General Bureau of Instruments and Meters (1981-1983), deputy chief engineer at the Bureau of Instruments and Meters under the 1st Ministry of Machine-Building Industry (1983-1985), deputy secretary-general, secretary-general and vice-council chairman of the China Welfare Fund for Handicapped (1985-1988), and as deputy secretary-general of the CPPCC 7th National Committee (1988).

**Liu Shunyao (4)**

Identified as deputy commander of the PLA Air Force. (GJJ, 1995/5, p.71) Liu has served as deputy commander of the Air Force of Lanzhou Military Region since July 1990.

**Ma Weizhi (5)**

Identified as deputy commander of Jinan Military Region. (GJJ, 1995/5, p.71) He has served as vice-president of the PLA National Defence University since November 1990. Ma was born in March 1930 in Muling County, Heilongjiang Province. He joined the Northeast People's Self-Government Army in 1945 and the CCP in 1947. He served as column staff officer of the Northeast Field Army (1947-1949) and as chief of the Regiment Operational Section of the Fourth Field Army (1950). Ma participated in the Liaoxi-Shenyang and Beiping-Tientsin campaigns. He went into the Korean War in 1951, and served as chief of the Division Operational Training Section (1953), deputy regiment commander and chief of staff (1955) and as deputy chief of the Corps Operational Training Section (1955) of the "Chinese People's Volunteers" in Korea. In 1961 he graduated from the Basics Department of the PLA Military Academy. **Ma Zhanmin (6)**

Identified as deputy commander of Beijing Military Region. (GJJ, 1995/5, p.71) He has served as deputy commander of Lanzhou Military Region and commander of its Air Force since 1993. Ma was born in July 1932 in Shen County, Hebei Province. He joined the PLA in 1947 and the CCP in 1949. He took part in Northern Baoding, Qingfengdian and Shijiazhuang campaigns. In 1951 he graduated from the PLA Air Force Aviation School. He joined the "Chinese People's Volunteers" (CPV) in Korea in 1951 and served as squadron commander in the CPV Air Force (1951-1953). He then served in the PLA Air Force as group commander (1954-1956), regiment commander (1960-1965), division commander (1970-1976), director of the Military Training Department of the PLA Air Force Headquarters (1976-1977), deputy chief of staff of the PLA Air Force (1977-1982), chief of staff of the PLA Air Force (1982-1987), and as deputy commander of the Air Force of Lanzhou Military Region (1987-1993). He was a deputy to the 6th and 8th NPC. Ma was granted rank of Air Force lieutenant general in 1990.

**Qin Xiao (7)**

Appointed president of China International Trust and Investment Corporation (CITIC). (XNA, 4 May 95) He took over the post from Wang Jun who became board chairman of CITIC. Qin, 48, became CITIC vice-president last year. He joined CITIC in 1986 and has served as deputy general manager of the Business Department, president of the CITIC Development Co Ltd and chairman of CITIC Australia. As vice-president of CITIC, Qin was mainly responsible for corporate planning and internal management for CITIC business operations in Australia and Europe.

**Wang Jun**

Appointed board chairman of China International Trust and Investment Corporation (CITIC). (XNA, 4 May 95) He has served as CITIC president since April 1993. Wang Jun, 54, is the son of former PRC vice-president Wang Zhen who died in 1993. CITIC was founded in 1979 by Rong Yiren, now China's vice-president. Joining CITIC since its inauguration, Wang has served successively as deputy general manager and general manager of the Business Department, vice-president, vice-chairman and president of the CITIC Hong Kong (Holdings). See C.a., 1993/10, p.1058/14.

**Wang Mengkui (8)**

Wang replaced Yuan Mu as director of the State Council Research Office. (XNA, 19 May 95) He has served as deputy director of the office since August 1990. Wang was born in April 1938 in Wen County, He'nan Province, and joined the CCP in 1956. After graduating from the Economics Department of Beijing University in 1964, he served as editor of *Hongqi Magazine* (Red Flag) (1964-1969). He later served as associate research fellow, deputy head of the Economic Group, and research fellow of the Research Office of the CCP CC Secretariat (1979-1987), and as full-time member and deputy director of the Economic Research Centre of the State Planning Commission (1987-1990). Wang was a member of the working body responsible for drafting resolutions for the 3rd plenary session of the 14th CCP CC. He is an alternate member of the 14th CCP CC. Wang is author of *The Economy at the Elementary Socialist Stage, An Exploration of the Road of Chinese Socialist Construction, The Cause of and Strategy for Inflation*, and *Selected Works of Wang Mengkui*.

**Wang Xianzheng (9)**

Appointed vice-minister of coal industry. (XNA, 19 May 95)

**Wang Xuebing**

Wang, president of the Bank of China since December 1993, was appointed chairman of the Board. (XNA, 19 May 95) For his vita see C.a., 1993/12, p.1216/12.

**Wang Yongguo**

Identified as commander of the South China Sea Fleet. (GJJ, 1995/5, p.71) Wang has served as deputy commander of the East China Sea Fleet since January 1993. See C.a., 1993/10, p.1058/14.

**Xin Dianfeng (10)**

Identified as deputy commander of the PLA Air Force. (GJJ, 1995/5, p.71) Xin was born in December 1933 in Shuangliao County, Jilin Province, and joined the CCP in 1951. He joined the Northeast Democratic United Army in 1947 and took part in the Liaoxi-Shenyang and Marching Southwest campaigns. In 1950 he joined the Korean War and served as team leader of the cultural troupe of the Political Department of the "Chinese People's Volunteers" in Korea. After graduating from the Air Force Aviation School in 1957, he served as pilot, squadron leader, deputy group commander, commander of independent group, regiment commander and deputy division commander of the Air Force Aviation (1957-1978). He then served as deputy director and director of the Military Training Department of the PLA Air Force

(1978-1983), as director of a military regional Air Force command post (1983-1984), as deputy chief of staff of the PLA Air Force (1984-1990), deputy commander of the Air Force of Ji'nan Military Region (1990-1993), deputy commander and Air Force commander of Shenyang Military Region (1993), and as chief of staff of the PLA Air Force (1993). Yichang City (Hubei Province), where the Three Gorges water conservation project is being built, has recently forged friendly ties with a German county, Ludwigsburg, in Baden-Wuerttemberg. (XNA, 15 May 95)

### Jamaica (May 12)

An agreement on mutual exemption of official travel visas between China and Jamaica was signed in Kingston. (Xinhua, 6 June 95, in SWB, 12 June 95)

### Kenya (May 17)

An agreement on the donation of about 120.000 US\$ worth of Chinese environment protection equipment to Kenya was signed in Nairobi by visiting State Councillor Song Jian and Minister of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation Kalonzo Musyoka. (XNA, 18 May 95)

### Lebanon (May 16)

A protocol on cooperation between China and Lebanon in the textile and clothes industry was signed in Beirut by visiting Chinese Minister of Textile Industry Wu Wenying and the Chairman of the Lebanese Industrialists Association. (XNA, 18 May 95)

### Macedonia (May 31)

An agreement on culture cooperation between China and the Republic of Macedonia was signed in Beijing by Chinese Minister of Culture Liu Zhongde and visiting Macedonian Foreign Minister Stevo Crvenkovski. An economic and trade agreement was also signed. (XNA, 1 June 95)

### Mauritius (May 22)

Three documents for cooperation between China and Mauritius were signed in Beijing by Chinese Minister of Foreign Trade and Economic Cooperation Wu Yi and visiting Mauritian Deputy Prime Minister Prem Nababsing. (XNA, 23 May 95)

### Mauritius (May 22)

An agreement between the governments of China and Mauritius on air services was signed in Beijing by Chen Guangyi, director of the Civil Aviation Administration of China, and visiting Mauritian Deputy Prime Minister Prem Nababsing. (XNA, RMRB, 24 May 95)

### Myanmar (May 25)

Chinese Ambassador to Myanmar Chen Baoliu, on behalf of the Red Cross Society of China, donated in Yangon 10,000 US\$ to Myanmar fire victims. (XNA, 26 May 95)

### Russia (May 16)

Moscow became Beijing's 22nd foreign "Sister city". An agreement on the establishment of sisterly ties between Beijing and Moscow was signed in Beijing by Li Qiyan and Yuri Luzhkov, mayors of the two cities. (XNA, 17 May 95)

### Seychelles (May 25)

An agreement on economic and technological cooperation and an exchange of notes on China's grant of a batch of goods and supplies to Seychelles were signed in Beijing. President Jiang Zemin and visiting President France Albert Rene attended the signing ceremony. (XNA, 26 May 95)

### Singapore (May 31)

The Chinese Foreign Ministry and the Foreign Ministry of Singapore signed a memorandum of understanding in Singapore for establishing a mechanism for annual consultations between officials of the two ministries. (XNA, 1 June 95)

### Sweden (May 11)

The Shanghai Port, the largest in China, signed sisterhood ties with the Gothenburg Port of Sweden in Shanghai. (XNA, 13 May 95)

### Syria (May 04?)

An agreement on the establishment of sister provincial relations between Liaoning Province and Syria's Aleppo Province was signed during the visit of Yehya Asaleh, minister of the Local Administration of Syria. (XNA, 5 May 95)

**Turkey (May 23)**

An agreement on the avoidance of double taxation and prevention of tax evasion between China and Turkey and an executive plan between the two governments for 1994-1996 cultural exchanges were signed in Beijing. President Jiang Zemin and visiting Turkish President Suleyman Demirel attended the signing ceremony. (XNA, 24 May 95)

**United States (May 03)**

A scientific and technological cooperation agreement was signed in Wuhan City by Governor of Hubei Province Jiang Zhuping and George Voinovich, governor of the US State of Ohio. Hubei forged friendly relations with Ohio in October 1979. (XNA, 4 May 95)

**Vietnam (May 17)**

An agreement on the avoidance of double taxation and prevention of fiscal evasion with respect to taxes on income between China and Vietnam was signed in Beijing. (XNA, 18 May 95)

**Zimbabwe (May 04)**

The Chinese government donated Zim-dollars one million (125,000 US\$) worth of sport equipment to the All African Games scheduled for September in Harare. (XNA, 5 May 95)

**International Agreements**

The Chinese government and the United Nations International Drug Control Programme (UNDCP) signed a 2.9m-US\$ project in Beijing on May 22, 1995 to improve the capability of law enforcement authorities in Southwest China's Yunnan Province to control trafficking in narcotic drugs and chemicals used to make drugs. (XNA, 23 May 95)

Five Northeast Asian countries signed three agreements in Beijing on May 30, 1995 on future cooperation in developing the Tumen river area that borders China, the Democratic Republic of Korea (DPRK) and Russia. The heads of delegations from China, the DPRK, the Republic of Korea, Mongolia and Russia signed the Establishment of the Tumen River Area Development Coordination Committee agreement, which concerns the three countries that share the river boundary.
