**Newly Appointed Leaders****Dai Bingguo**

Identified as deputy director of the CCP CC Liaison Department. (Central Broadcasting Station, Pyongyang, 6 Oct 95, in SWB, 9 Oct 95) Dai has served as vice-minister of foreign affairs until September 1995. For his vita see C.a., 1994/2, p.217/11.

**Fu Quanyou**

Newly-appointed chief of the PLA General Staff. (XNA, 6 Oct 95) General Fu, member of the PRC Central Military Commission and CCP CC Military Commission, succeeds Zhang Wannian who was promoted to vice-chairman of the CCP CC Military Commission last month. Fu Quanyou has served as director of the General Logistics Department since November 1992. He is a member of the 14th CCP CC. For his vita see C.a., 1993/3, p.277/11.

**Lin Zhaoshu (1)**

Elected deputy secretary of CCP Fujian Provincial Committee at the 1st plenary session of the 6th Provincial Party Committee on October 19, 1995. (RMRB, 20 Oct 95) He has been a Standing Committee member of CCP Fujian Provincial Committee since May 1992. Lin concurrently serves as member of the CCP CC Commission for Inspecting Discipline (since October 1992) and as secretary of the CCP Fujian Provincial Commission for Inspecting Discipline (since May 1992). Lin was born in Fuzhou City in February 1940 and joined the CCP in 1960. In 1959 he graduated from the Fujian Pro-

vincial School of Architectural Engineering. He later served as secretary of the General Office of CCP Fujian Provincial Committee (1975-1979), secretary of the State Council's Overseas Chinese Affairs Office (1979-1982), secretary of CYL Fujian Provincial Committee (1982-1984), and as deputy secretary of CCP Fujian Provincial Commission for Politics and Law (1984-1985) and of CCP Fujian Provincial Commission for Inspecting Discipline (1985).

**Su Guang (2)**

Identified as vice-president of the Chinese People's Association for Friendship with Foreign Countries. (RMRB, XNA, 14 Oct 95)

**Wang Ke**

Appointed director of the PLA General Logistics Department. (Xinhua, 10 Oct 95, in SWB, 13 Oct 95) He became a new member of the CCP CC Military Commission in Setember 1995. Wang is a member of the 14th CCP CC. For his vita see C.a., 1995/9, p.867/11.

**Xi Jinping (3)**

Elected deputy secretary of CCP Fujian Provincial Committee at the 1st plenary session of the 6th Provincial Party Committee on October 19, 1995. (RMRB, 20 Oct 95) Xi has been a Standing Committee member of CCP Fujian Provincial Committee since March 1994. He has served as Secretary of CCP Fuzhou City Committee since May 1990. Xi was born in June 1953 in Fuping County, Shaanxi Province, and joined the CCP in 1974. In 1979 he graduated from the Engineering Chemistry Department of Qinghua University. Xi later served as deputy secretary and secretary of CCP Zhengding County Committee (1982-1985), Standing Committee member of CCP Xiamen City Committee and vice-mayor of Xiamen (1985-1988), secretary of CCP Ningde Prefectural Committee (1988-1990), and as chairman of the Standing Committee of Fuzhou City People's Congress.

**Zhang Qiong (4)**

Appointed deputy procurator-general of the Supreme People's Procuratorate. (RMRB, 31 Oct 95) Zhang, 46, has been a member of the Procuratorial Committee since July 1989. He formerly served as director of the Procuratorate's General Office and as editor-in-chief of *China Procuratorial News*.

**Zheng Peimin (5)**

Elected deputy secretary of CCP Hunan Provincial Committee at the 1st plenary session of the 7th Provincial

Party Committee on October 13, 1995. (RMRB, XNA, 14 Oct 95) He concurrently serves as vice-governor of Hunan Provincial People's Government (since January 1993). Zheng was born in July 1943 in Wu'an City, Hebei Province, and joined the CCP in 1969. In 1968 he graduated from the Physics Department of Jilin University. He later served as director of the General Office and as deputy secretary and secretary of the Commission for Inspecting Discipline of the CCP Committee of Xiangtan Electrical Machinery Plant (1970-1983), deputy secretary and secretary of CCP Xiangtan City Committee (1983-1990), and as secretary of CCP Xiangxi Tujia and Miao Autonomous Prefectural Committee (1990-1992).

**Luosang Lingzhi Duojie**

Appointed vice-governor of Gansu Provincial People's Government at the 17th Standing Committee Meeting of the 8th Provincial People's Congress on September 23, 1995. (Gansu Ribao, 24 Sep 95, in SWB, 9 Nov 95)

**Wang Chen (10)**

Appointed editor-in-chief of *Guangming Daily*. He has served as deputy editor-in-chief since August 1986. Wang succeeds Xu Guangchun, who was appointed deputy director of the CCP CC Propaganda Department this year.

Identified as deputy commander of Jilin Military District. (Jilin Ribao, 2 Aug 95, in ZGYJ, 1995/9, p.146) Wen formerly served as the district's chief-of-staff.

**Xu Zhenzhong (12)**

Vice Admiral Xu Zhenzhong was appointed deputy commander of the PLA Navy on August 21, 1995.

**Yue Haiyan (13)**

Rear Admiral Yue was appointed political commissar of the PLA Navy's East China Sea Fleet on August 21, 1995. He has served as deputy political commissar of the South China Sea Fleet since July 1991. Yue is an alternate member of the 14th CCP CC.

**Zhai Ligong (14)**

Identified as deputy director of the State Bureau of Statistics. (Xinhua she, 22 Aug 95, in ZGYJ, 1995/9, p.145)

**Zheng Xinmiao (15)**

Appointed vice-governor of Qinghai Provincial People's Government at the

He once served as vice-magistrate of Huang County and secretary of CCP Huang County Committee. In 1989 Du became mayor of Yantai City, and in March 1992 secretary of CCP Yantai City Committee (post held until now). Han Yuqun was born in May 1943 and joined the CCP in December 1975. He once served as technician and director of Ji'ning City Instrument Plant in Shandong Province. After 1983 he served as deputy secretary of CCP Ji'ning City Committee, mayor of Ji'ning City and as secretary of CCP Ji'ning City Committee. In March 1993 Han became director of the Provincial Economic Commission, and in November 1993 Standing Committee member and director of the United Front Department of CCP Shandong Provincial Committee (latter posts held until now). #### Argentina (Oct 04)

President Jiang Zemin and visiting President Carlos Saul Menem attended a signing ceremony for an agreement on establishing consulates general in the two countries. (XNA, 5 Oct 95)

#### Australia (Oct 24)

Shanghai signed an agreement of friendly exchanges for the 1996-1998 period with the State of Queensland in Australia. (XNA, 26 Oct 95)

#### Canada (Oct 13)

The signing of a memorandum between the Chinese and Canadian governments on Consultation of the Qinshan CANDU Nuclear Power Plant and the Agreement Between the China National Nuclear Corporation and Atomic Energy of Canada Ltd on Principles of Commercial Negotiations to Build Two CANDU 700MWe Nuclear Units at Qinshan near Shanghai, was witnessed in Ottawa by visiting Chinese Premier Li Peng and Canadian Prime Minister Jean Chretien. (RMRB, XNA, 15 Oct 95)

#### Ethiopia (Oct 30)

An agreement on economic and technological cooperation was signed in Beijing between the Chinese and Ethiopian governments. (XNA, 31 Oct 95)

#### Greece (Oct 16)

An agreement on maritime transport between China and Greece was signed in Beijing. Chinese Vice-Premier and Foreign Minister Qian Qichen and Greek Minister of Foreign Affairs Karolos Papoulias attended the signing ceremony. (XNA, 17 Oct 95)

#### Hungary (Oct 09)

China and Hungary signed in Beijing an agreement on judicial assistance in civil and business affairs between the two countries. Chinese Minister of Justice Xiao Yang and his Hungarian counterpart Pal Vastagh signed the agreement on behalf of their respective governments. (RMRB, XNA, 10 Oct 95)

#### Israel (Oct 23)

China and Israel signed an agreement in Jerusalem on establishing a 5-million-US\$ joint scientific research and development fund. The agreement was signed by visiting Chinese State Councillor and Chairman of the State Science and Technology Commission Song Jian and his Israeli counterpart Shulamit Aloni in the presence of Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres. (XNA, 24 Oct 95)

#### Japan (Oct 31)

China and Japan signed letters in Beijing exchanged between the two sides on Japan's supply of its third batch of governmental loans to China in 1995. According to the document, the Japanese government should provide China with a governmental loan valued at 141.429bn ¥ within 1995. The loan will be used for 11 projects, including the expansion of Beijing's Capital Airport and a water-supply project in Xi'an, capital of Shaanxi Province. The annual interest of the loan is 2.3% and the repayment term is 30 years. Tang Jiaxuan, Chinese vice-minister of foreign affairs, and Yoshiyasu Sato, Japanese ambassador to China, signed the document. It is learned that the concrete conditions and procedures for the loans will be determined in an agreement which will be signed in the near future by Gong Yongjiang, vice-minister of foreign trade and economic cooperation, and Akira Nishigaki, president of the Overseas Economic Cooperation Fund of Japan. The third batch of Japanese governmental loans to China were provided starting in 1990. The loans are used in 42 projects. So now, the total of the Japanese governmental loans to China in this period has reached 1,610.9bn ¥. Within three years from 1996, Japan will provide governmental loans totaling 580bn ¥ to China, which will be used in 40 projects, including 15 environmental protection ones. (RMRB, XNA, 1 Nov 95)

#### Kirghizstan (Oct 23)

China and Kirghizstan signed three documents on cooperation in Beijing. The documents are an agreement between the two governments on scientific and technological cooperation; an a-

reement between the two governments on the guaranteeing of the quality of import and export commodities; and an agreement on educational cooperation for 1995-1999 between the State Education Commission of China and the Ministry of Education and Science of Kirghizstan. Chinese Premier Li Peng and visiting Kirghiz Prime Minister Apas Dzhumagulov attended the signing ceremony. (XNA, 24 Oct 95)

#### **North Korea (Oct 05)**

The Chinese government has decided to provide an emergency aid of materials worth 30m RMBY (about 3.7m US\$) as a disaster relief to the flood-stricken area of the DPRK. (RMRB, XNA, 6 Oct 95)

#### **South Korea (Oct 04)**

South Korea and China reach agreement on nuclear energy cooperation. Chong Kun-mo, minister of science and technology, held a third meeting of the ROK-PRC Science and Technology Joint Committee in Beijing, China, with Song Jian, chairman of the State Science and Technology Commission. At the meeting, the two sides agreed to establish the "ROK-PRC Nuclear Energy Joint Committee". (*Hanguk Ilbo*, Seoul, 5 Oct 95, in SWB, 9 Oct 95)

#### **Luxembourg (Oct 05)**

An agreement on Luxembourg providing a low interest loan to China totaling 200m Luxembourg francs was signed in Luxembourg by Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Jacques Boos and visiting Chinese Vice-Premier and Foreign Minister Qian Qichen. (RMRB, 6 Oct 95)

#### **Luxembourg (Oct 06)**

Luxembourg has agreed to provide China with 2bn Luxembourg francs (about 6.5m US\$) in government loans to help rebuild metallurgical enterprises. The agreement was reached during a three-day visit by Chinese Vice-Premier and Foreign Minister Qian Qichen. (XNA, 8 Oct 95)

#### **Mali (Oct 30)**

Two economic accords were signed in Bamako in the presence of visiting Chinese Vice-Premier Li Lanqing and Mali Prime Minister Ibrahim Boubacar Kaita. Under the two accords, China will provide Mali with a grant of 25m RMBY (about 3m US\$) and a soft loan of 50m RMBY (about 6m US\$) with an annual interest rate of 4%. (XNA, 1 Nov 95)

#### **Mexico (Oct 06)**

Visiting Chinese Premier Li Peng and Mexican President Ernesto Zedillo

Ponce De Leon attended the signing ceremony in Mexico City for a memorandum and two agreements that are related to cooperation in advancing social progress, telecommunications and academic exchanges between diplomats. (RMRB, XNA, 8 Oct 95)

#### **Morocco (Oct 04)**

Visiting Chinese Premier Li Peng and Moroccan Prime Minister Abdellatif Filali attended in Rabat the ceremony of signing a document on China's donation of 5m RMBY to the Moroccan government, and the ceremony of signing the implementation plan of the two governments on cultural cooperation for 1996, 1997 and 1998. (XNA, 5 Oct 95)

#### **Netherlands (Oct 13)**

China and the Netherlands signed in The Hague a memorandum of understanding concerning economic cooperation between small and medium-sized companies of the two countries. The document was signed by visiting Chinese Minister of Foreign Trade and Economic Cooperation Wu Yi and Dutch Minister for Foreign Trade A. van Dok-van Weele. (XNA, 15 Oct 95; RMRB, 16 Oct 95)

#### **Peru (Oct 10)**

Visiting Chinese Premier Li Peng and Peruvian President Alberto Fujimori attended in Lima the signing ceremony of an agreement under which the Bank of China will provide the Peruvian government a 150m US\$ Buyers' credit. (XNA, 12 Oct 95)

#### **Sudan (Oct 06)**

The Chinese government and the Sudanese government signed in Beijing recently an agreement on mutual exemption of visas, which is to go into force on 26th October this year. (XNA, 7 Oct 95; RMRB, 9 Oct 95)

#### **Switzerland (Oct 31)**

An agreement on the fourth group of loans from the Swiss to the Chinese government was signed in Beijing by Wu Yi, Chinese minister of foreign trade and economic cooperation, and Jean-Pascal Delamuraz, visiting vice-president of the Federal Council and head of Federal Department of Public Economy. (XNA, 1 Nov 95)

#### **Thailand (Oct 05)**

The Chinese government has offered 300,000 US\$ in cash to the Thai government for flood relief operations. (XNA, 6 Oct 95)

#### **United States (Oct 18)**

The ninth session of the Sino-US Joint Committee on Commerce and Trade (JCCT) closed in Beijing with eight

agreements of cooperation signed. Chinese Minister of Foreign Trade and Economic Cooperation Wu Yi and US Secretary of Commerce Ron Brown signed a declaration of cooperation of the Business Development Committee (BDC) of the Sino-US JCCT and a joint declaration of the Joint Steering Committee. According to the declaration of cooperation, the BDC will push and coordinate economic and trade cooperation between the two countries as well as their respective states and provinces. Officials from the two sides also signed terms of reference for telecommunications, terms of reference for environmental protection and a pharmaceuticals subgroup agreement as well as a memorandum of understanding on patent cooperation and other documents. (XNA, 19 Oct 95) The JCCT signed two noteworthy documents on environmental protection. (Zhongguo xinwen she news agency, Beijing, 18 Oct 95)

#### **United States (Oct 18)**

A Sino-US environmental protection programme (GLOBE plan) was signed in Beijing by the Director of the State Bureau of Environmental Protection Xie Zhenhua and US Secretary of Commerce Ron Brown. US Vice-President Al Gore sent a message of congratulation for the signing. (Zhongguo xinwen she news agency, Beijing, 18 Oct 95)

#### **Yemen (Oct 12)**

Yemen and China signed in Sanaa an executive program on educational cooperation from 1995 to 1997 between the two countries. (XNA, 13 Oct 95)

#### **Yugoslavia (Oct 18)**

An agreement on scientific and technical cooperation between the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia and the People's Republic of China was signed in Beijing by Janko Radulovic, the federal minister for science, development and environmental affairs, and Xu Guanhua, vice-chairman of the State Science and Technology Commission. (Tanjug news agency, Belgrade, 18 Oct 95, in SWB, 20 Oct 95)

## **International Agreements**

The United Nations Development Program (UNDP) agreed to help China in establishing a Sustainable Development Networking Program. Deng Nan, vice-chairman of the State Science and Technology Commission, and UNDP administrator James Speth signed an agreement on the project in New York

on October 17, 1995. Deng Nan said that in July 1992, not long after the Rio summit conference concluded, China began to formulate the 21st Century Agenda, whose implementation was ratified in March 1994. She said that in implementing the 21st Century Agenda, China needed foreign countries' experience and technology. By joining the "sustainable development network", China would obtain the relevant information and at the same time provide other countries with its experience and technology. (Xinhua, 18 Oct 95, in SWB, 30 Oct 95; XNA, 19 Oct 95)

"Civil Aviation Law of the People's Republic of China", adopted at the 16th meeting of the 8th NPC Standing Committee on October 30, 1995. This law will become effective as of March 1, 1996. (Decree No.56 of the President of the PRC, signed by President Jiang Zemin on October 30, 1995) (Full text of the law: RMRB, 11 Nov 95)

"Resolution on Punishment for the Crimes of Falsely Making Out, Forging and Illegally Selling Special Value-Added Tax Invoices", adopted at the 16th meeting of the 8th NPC Standing Committee on October 30, 1995. This resolution will become effective on the day of promulgation. (Decree No.57 of the President of the PRC, signed by President Jiang Zemin on October 30, 1995) (Full text of the law: RMRB, 1 Nov 95; Xinhua, 31 Oct 95, in SWB, 16 Nov 95)

"Law of the People's Republic of China on Environmental Prevention and Control of Solid Waste Pollution", adopted at the 16th meeting of the 8th NPC Standing Committee on October 30, 1995. This law will become effective as of April 1, 1996. (Decree No.58 of the President of the PRC, signed by President Jiang Zemin on October 30, 1995) (Full text of the law: RMRB, 10 Nov 95)

"Food Hygiene Law of the People's Republic of China", adopted at the 16th meeting of the 8th NPC Standing Committee on October 30, 1995. This law will become effective on the day of promulgation. (Decree No.59 of the President of the PRC, signed by President Jiang Zemin on October 30, 1995) (Full text of the law: RMRB, 1 Nov 95)

"Regulations on Visits and Complaints". The regulations will become effective on January 1, 1996. (Decree No.185 of the State Council of the PRC, signed by Premier Li Peng on October 28, 1995) (Full text: RMRB, 1 Nov 95; Xinhua, 30 Oct 95, in SWB, 10 Nov 95)

"Provisional Regulations on the Management of Employment Liaison Offices that Introduce Foreign Professionals to Work in China" have been jointly formulated by the State Bureau of Foreign Experts and the State Administration for Industry and Commerce. (XNA, 18 Oct 95)

"Administrative Measures for Foreign Economic Experts Working in China" have been formulated by the State Bureau of Foreign Experts. (XNA, 18 Oct 95)

The State Economic and Trade Commission and the State Commission for Restructuring Economy have recently laid down new regulations for business mergers and acquisitions. (Zhongguo xinwen she news agency, Beijing, 27 Oct 95, in SWB, 30 Oct 95)

China's first rules governing the professional activities of architects have been promulgated. According to the rules, China will set up two grades in appraising architects. The first grade is for international operations and the second is for domestic operations. The certified architect system will be put into official operation as of June 1, 1996. (XNA, 26 Oct 95)

China published a regulation on October 31, 1995, concerning the maintenance, exchange and return of goods after sale in a bid to safeguard the consumers' interests. Also published was the first catalog of 18 kinds of goods subject to the new regulation, most of them being durable consumer goods. The regulation was published to replace one published in 1986 which only applied to some household electrical appliances. (XNA, 1 Nov 95)
