Completed Projects

Rolling Stock

Under an agreement of 1957, 25 million rupees (out of a total of 75 million as granted that year) were to be used for several items of rolling stock: 202 goods carriages, 14 tank carriages and 8 passenger coaches (1). Under supplementary arrangements, the quotas were increased to 202 goods carriages, 653 tank carriages and 70 passenger coaches (2). Under a protocol of July 1965, China undertook to supply another 162 railway carriages (3). These 162 were worth 6.3 million rupees (4). The first delivery by October 1962 included 202 goods carriages, 13 tank carriages and 8 passenger coaches (5). The second delivery in 1964 consisted of 235 passenger coaches and goods carriages worth 12 million rupees (6); the third in 1965/66 of 116 passenger coaches and goods carriages worth 4.85 million rupees. The carriages of the third batch were intended for use on the reopened Puttalam line so as to improve transport facilities to the second cement plant in this district (8).

Conference Hall

Under a protocol of February 1964, the foundation stone for the Colombo conference hall was laid in March the same year (1). Construction started in November 1970 (2) and was completed in May 1973 (3). The original design of 1964 was for an 8-storeyed building with a congress hall seating 1,500 persons and equipped with a simultaneous translation system for English, French, Russian, Chinese, Spanish, Singhalese, and other languages. The whole block, erected on a surface of 11 ha, also contains rooms for sessions, exhibitions, for banquets, and other purposes, the total floorspace being 32,000 square metres. On the perimeter of the magnificent structure are 40 white marble columns, 24 metres high, each topped with a golden capital beneath deep eaves. Peach-coloured marble walls and four white sculptured marble pillars flank the front entrance, in Sri Lanka national style. In front of the entrance gate is a 10m high fountain. In the large entrance hall is a bust of the late Prime Minister Solomon Bandaranaike (4). A group of 6 Chinese experts arrived in Colombo in Aug 12, 1970 (5). It consisted of architects and technicians who were to complete the preparatory work for the project within six weeks (6). The conference hall is a Chinese gift. More than 400 Chinese workers and technicians went to work on the conference hall. This project had been accepted by the first Bandaranaike government in 1964 but was interrupted when the new Senanayake government thought it too colossal (7). Work on the project therefore did not begin until Mrs.Bandaranaike had returned to power. There is no information as to whether or not the project was constructed according to the design from 1964. The Chinese maintenance team left Colombo in October 1974 (8).

Small Textile Mills

50 small textile mills, each of them equipped with 48 looms, in 1968 were under construction in Sri Lanka with Chinese aid (1). The cost of one mill is Rp 0.5m. (2), hence the costs of all 50 mills total Rp 25m. This sum is taken out of the Chinese 50m. Rp donation of 1962. By March 1968, 25 mills had been completed (1). From March until December 1968 the following mills were completed: In Kegalle District, Sabaragamuve Province (1); Eheliyagoda (2); and Rambukkana, 100 km northeast of Colombo (3).

Textile Mill I

Under protocols of June 1959 (1), November 1964 (2) and June 1972 (3), construction of the Pugoda textile mill started in October 1971 (4). In March 1975 the mill was inaugurated. It is an outright gift to Sri Lanka from the Chinese government (5). The mill was to comprise workshops for spinning, weaving, printing and dyeing (3). In September 1982 a cotton cloth finishing plant of the Pugoda textile was completed and handed over. With the completion of this finishing plant, the Pugoda textile mill has become a completely and fully equipped textile mill. While the plant is estimated to have cost over Rp. 133 million, it is provided with a capacity to produce over 16 million meters of cloth annually (6).

Textile Mill II

Under a protocol of February 1970 the Minneriya textile mill (1), between Colombo and Kandy, was set up with Chinese assistance (2). The foundation stone was laid in May 1976 (3). The inauguration took place in May 1978. The mill has 25,000 spindles (4) and 600 looms (1) and a capacity to produce 1.6 million kilogrammes of yarn per year (5). The mill was to cost 70 million rupees (6). In 1977 125 million rupees had been earned in foreign exchange from this source; the envisaged amount for 1978 was 500 million rupees (7).

Fishery Projects

To help expand Sri Lanka's freshwater fish farming program a group of Chinese experts came to the country in 1971 for comprehensive studies (1). Another group followed in 1974 (2). In January 1975, finally, a contract was signed under which Chinese experts were to set up a fresh water fish-breeding research center at cost of about 5 million rupees (3). Some months later the entire costs of the project were estimated at 10 million rupees (4).

Until 1978 the experimental fish farming station was established in Uda-Walave (1). One of the station's successes was the artificial spawning of Chinese grass carp (5); more than 200,000 fry were produced. A successful artificial hatching of the Chinese "Big Head" fish produced 284,000 fingerlings which later were raised in rivers, lakes and reservoirs (6). In 1977 twelve pisciculturists went to China under a UNDP-FAO project for training in inland water fisheries (7). Under a new contract of February 1982, the station is to be expanded (1). A contract for the establishment of a joint China-Sri Lanka fisheries company was signed in Colombo on 28th November. The joint venture, the Lanhua Fisheries Company, will operate in Sri Lanka in the fields of marine fishing, marine product processing and culture of fish and prawns for local marketing and export. The contributions to the company's capital by the two parties to the contract, the Ceylon Fisheries Corporation of Sri Lanka and the China International Engineering Corporation for Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries, are 51% and 49% respectively. The creation of the joint venture was preceded by a field survey carried out by the Chinese party on the fisheries resources in Sri Lanka early this year (8).

Geological Prospecting

In the spring of 1971, a group of Chinese geologists arrived in Sri Lanka to engage in prospecting work at the Ceylonese government's orders (1).

Flood Control Project

In 1973 a Chinese expert group undertook a feasibility study on the Gin Ganga control project (1). The 110-km long Gin Ganga river flows in the southern part of Sri Lanka. The plain in its lower reaches was often flooded which greatly affected agricultural production (2). Construction of the project started in 1976 and was completed in September 1982. The entire project consists of over 170 items and covers an area

of 200 kilometres on both banks of the river. Among the main items built are 74 bunds, 10 pumping stations, a switch centre, 21 drainage channels totalling of 33.7 kilometres, eight highway bridges and 36.6 kilometres of 33 kv transmission line (3).

Hoe Factory

Construction of a new mammoty (hoe) factory at Yakkla, some 30 km northeast of Colombo, was completed in January 1984. The Yakkla factory under the Ceylon State Hardware Corporation had not been operating normally for years due to out-dated equipment and nonmaintenance. The corporation declared in August, 1981, that it would invite foreign tenders for the restructuring of the plant. Carroway Enterprises Ltd. of Hongkong won the bid with the offer of 1.69 million U.S.\$ and asked the China General Electric Corporation to contract the project and undertake the responsibility of providing the equipment and carrying out installation, trial production and technical training. The installation of equipment startet in May 1983 (1).

Agricultural Project

This project was envisaged in 1979. It aimed to enable cultivators to acquire training on new agricultural structure (1). It is situated in Talawa, about 200 km east of Colombo. Construction of this Malwanagama farm began in August 1982 under an agreement signed between the governments earlier. Its aim is to introduce through demonstration Chinese agricultural techniques and cultivate improved varieties of grains for the development of Sri Lanka's agriculture. The farm now has opened up 127 acres of land apart from housing construction and the erection of necessary equipment ranging from maintenance to laboratory apparatuses. During the construction period, the farm has trial-produced three crops of rice, cotton and beans with good

Power Plant

The Nelambe Oya hydropower project is to be set up with Chinese assistance. The project will have a capacity of 3,200 kw when completed. Its initial survey was completed in 1980 and the contract for designing the power station was signed in 1981. This will be the largest ever Chinese-designed hydro-power station in the country (1).

Bangladesh

On May 3 the foundation stone was laid for the Buriganga river bridge in Dhaka. China is to provide a special interest-free loan and technical assistance for this project as well as material and machines.

Renin

Construction on the Lokosa textile mill started on April 26. It is situated 100 km northwest of Cotonou and will use locally grown cotton to produce 13 million meters of material annually when it is completed in late 1986. (XNA, May 1, 1984)

Colombia

Under a contract of May 24 China agreed to dredge Colombia's port Barranquilla. The contract stipulates that the China Harbors Engineering Company will spend four months clearing up about 3.5 million cubic meters of mud in the navigation channels of port Barranquilla, which will be able to harbor large vessels after the dredge.

The Guyana side will provide 51% of the capital investment and the Chinese side 49%. The Guyanese side will also provide fishing, shrimping trawlers and facilites on land while the Chinese side

Iraq

The foundation stone for the Kifil Shinafiya irrigation project was laid on May 2. The project, priced at 174 million U.S.\$ and to be completed by April, 1987, includes four dams built on the lower reaches of the Euphrates river. It will bring under irrigation large areas in the three provinces of Najaf, Qadissiya and Babylon. (XNA, May 4, 1984)

The Red Cross of China has presented 15,000 U.S.\$ to the droughthit people of the country. (XNA, May 11, 1984)

With a total floor space of 56,012 square meters, the complex will include a 16-story main building, conference and banquet halls, a political museum and other facilities. (XNA, May 23, 1984)

Zimbabwe

A contract on the implementation of the Chitungwiza garment factory project was signed on May 3. Under the contract, the Chinese government will present to the Zimbabwean government a complete set of machinery for a clothing factory and undertake to provide experts and technicians to assist Zimbabweans to install machinery and also offer advice on management and the training of workers. 


