

China's Aid Projects in Nepal

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A Light Industry Projects

1. Leather and Shoe Factory The factory is located in Bansbari near Kathmandu (1). Its construction start-ed in May 1964 (2), the completion was in June the following year (3). The initial annual capacity was 21,000 pie-ces of leather and 303,000 pairs of shoes (4). The factory produced more than 26,000 pairs of shoes in the fisyear of 1968/69 and cal more than 63,000 pairs in fiscal 1971/72, the output growing by 2.4 times in four years. The output of leather was over 99,800 kg in fiscal 1968/69 and reached more than 167,200 kg in fiscal 1971/72, an increase of 70%. The total output value of the factory amounted to NR 2.66 million in fiscal 1971/72 which was 60% more than the 1.64 m. NR in fiscal 1968/69. By making use of scrap leather the factory has now begun to produce glue, sheath, belts, and other commodities, thus slashing production costs and increasing the variety of products. Nepal had no leather and shoe-making industry before 1965 (5). In 1972 the factory produced 31,000 pieces of leather and 66,000 pairs of shoes. The hides used for leathermaking are from Nepal. 90% of the sole leather are produced for export. The number of persons working in the management and production lines of the factory is 400. One working shift lasts 7 hours and 30 minutes (6). The tannery attached to the factory started trial production in April 1965 (7). The construction of the factory cost 7 million Nepalese rupies (8).

In 1973 the factory produced 66,000 pairs of leather shoes, meeting one fourth of the needs of Nepal (9). In the fiscal year of 1978-79 the total output value reached 10.2 million rupies, a nearly fivefold increase over 1972-73. In a drive to promote export, the factory sold 250 tons of shoe soles to China in 1978. 2. Leather Enterprise

Situated in Hetauda, a new city some 130 kilometers south of Kathmandu, the factory was equipped with a complete set of leather-making machines made and installed by China. It processes 500 hides per day. The inauguration took place in March 1982. The factory is also a joint venture between Nepal

3. Brick and Tile Factory

The factory is located at Lalitpur (1), at a distance of 5 kilometers from Kathmandu. The construction started in October 1965 (1) and was completed in March 1969 (2). The initial annual capacity was 20 million bricks and 500,000 tiles (3). In the fiscal year of 1971/72 the production rose to 30 million bricks (4). In 1972 the factory needed 3,000 tons of coal which was imported from India. The factory staff included 6 officers, 21 assistants and 23 clerks working in the administration and 5 officers, 37 assistants and 450 laborers working in production (5). In March 1972 letters were exchanged between China and Nepal regarding the expansion of the factory (6). 4. Brick Factory

Construction of the factory which is located in Bhaktapur in the Kathmandu valley began in March 1977 under an agreement of 1972. It was handed over in February 1979 and has an annual production capacity of 20 million bricks (1). 1) XNA, Feb 20, 1979

5. Cotton Textile Mill

It is situated in Hetauda, some 130 kilometers south of Kathmandu. The construction started in December 1975 (1) and was completed in December 1978 (2). The mill is the largest of its kind in Nepal and has an annual production capacity of 10 million meters of cloth of various colors and designs (2). The costs of the mill were 190 million Nepalese rupies (3). Nearly 550 workers are currently employed by the mill, which will engage 1,400 workers when it enters normal three-shift production in 1980 (4)). The mill meets about half of Nepal's total requirement for textile fabrics (5).

6. Sugar Mill

A Chinese industrial survey team came to Nepal in June 1978 to start a feasibility survey of sugar industries (1). In January 1982 China and Nepal agreed to build the mill in Sumwal Village, Nawalparasi, in Southwestern Nepal. After its completion it will have a daily crushing capacity of 1,000 tons of sugar-cane. An alcohol distillery attached to it will turn out 16,000 liters of alcohol per day (95 degrees) for industrial and medical use. The mill will be named after Lumbini, the birthplace of Buddha Sakyamuni. Nepal is self-sufficient in sugar. The sugar mill will enable the country to produce more sugar for domestic and foreign needs (2).

B Roads

1. Kathmandu-Kodari (Aranika Road)

The construction of this road started in June 1963 (1) and was provisionally opened for traffic up to 3 tons in December 1964 (2). Four fifths of the road pass along the banks of the rivers Chakchola, Indravati, Sunkesi and Bhote Kosi, in heigths of between 600 m and 1.200 m. The final section, which is 26 km long, leads to the frontier pass via difficult rocky territory (3). The road's total length is 114 km. The five large bridges permit the transport of loads of 30 m/t per axle (5). The longest bridge (176 m) is the Dolalghat bridge, 57 km north of Kathmandu, at the confluence of Rivers Idravati and Sunkosi. The width of this bridge which is made of reinforced concrete is 8 m (6). Length of the "Bridge of Friendship" at the frontier village of Bhaise where it crosses the river is 45 meters (5). The road builders started work simultaneously in five different places (1). The first 88 km are paved with as-phalt, the last 26 km from Barahbise to Kodari, with broken stones. Of the 37 bridges, 11 are in the last 26kmsection (7). 12,000 Nepalese workers took part in the road-building work. The number of Chinese technicians working on the first sections was between 50 and 90 (3). 500 Chinese workers worked in the 15 km section from Kodari to the south (8). During the construction of the road the doctors accompanying the group of Chinese experts gave medical aid to more than 100,000 Nepalese nationals (9).

On March 8, 1971 a protocol was signed under which China agreed to repair all sections of the road that had been destroyed by floods and landslides (10). In July 1981 27 kilometers of the road were seriously damaged by flood and the "Friendship Bridge" on it was washed away. China and Nepal exchanged letters on restoring the damage in January 1982 (11). The capital cost of this project is estimated at about 34 million US\$ (12).

2. Kathmandu - Pokhara (Prithvi Road)

The construction started in November 1965 (1) and was finished in 1973. It starts at Naubise, located 20 km from Kathmandu at the road to the Indian frontier. It follows the left bank of the Trisuli river, in a westerly direction,

to Tribeni Ghat. Thence it proceeds in a northwesterly direction, following the right bank of Marsyandi Khora river to Chyanglitar where it turns westward to Khairani and then again northwest, following the left bank of the Seti following river to the Pokhara valley (2). Its total length is 176 kilometers (3). A 125-meter suspension bridge crosses the Trisuli river at Munglingtar (4). The number of bridges in the course of the 176 km road totals 41, the longest being (a) the one across the Trisuli river at Munglingtar and (b) the one across the Madi river at Damauli which is 370 m long and 7.5 m wide (5). The Chinese technicians engaged in this project had previously con-structed the Kathmandu-Kodari road (6).

3. Kathmandu - Bhaktapur

The surveying of this road commenced in October 1968 (1). It was completed in 1970 (2). It has a length of 16 kilometers. the Bagmati bridge on its course has a length of 87 and a width of 20 meters with two sidewalks having a width of three meters each (3). 1) XNA, Oct 30, 1968; 2) XNA, Sep 16, 1970; 3) Told to the author by a Nepalese official in Feb 1973.

4. Kathmandu Ring Road

The construction started in March 1974 (1) and was completed in April 1977 (2). It has a total length of 27.2 kilometers and nine bridges and 108 culverts. The total volume of rocks and earth excavated amounted to 1.5 million cubic meters (1). The road links an industrial district in northwestern Kathmandu with another in the southeast, and the residential quarters with government buildings. 5. Pokhara - Surkhet

A Chinese survey team arrived in May 1973 to start work on a survey for a road connecting Pokhara with the far western region (1). Under an agreement signed in February 1975 China agreed to provide free financial grants and technical aid to Nepal for construction of the 407 km road (2). There is no further reference to this project up till 1983.

6. Gorkha - Narayanghat

Construction of the road started in February 1978 (1) and was completed in November 1981. It has a length of 61 kilometers (2) and a width of normally 7.5 m but in difficult mountain regions only 6.5 m with a black-topping of 5.5 m (3). The road has brought Nepal's renowned ancient capital of Gorkha, cut off from the outside world for centuries, within reach to the rest of the Kingdom, linking it with its arteries, the Mahendra highway and the Prithvi highway (1). 1) XNA, Feb 3, 1978; 2) XNA, Jan 11, 1982; 3) Kathmandu Radio, Dec 26, 1976; cit. C Electrification Projects

1. Sunkosi Hydroelectric Station

The station is located at the Sunkosi river, at the Kathmandu-Kodari road (1), about 80 km from Kathmandu (2). The construction started in the fall of 1968 (3) and was completed in Novem-ber 1972 (4). The station has an installed capacity of 10,000 kW (5). In December 1973 Nepal had an installed power of 55,000 kW of which hydroelectric power production accounts for more than 33,000 kW (6). Work on this project was directed by 60 Chinese technicians (7). In 1973 and 1974 the station generated 90 million kWh of electricity for Kathmandu and trained large numbers of Nepalese electricians. In 1975 it was managed by more than 100 Nepalese technicians and workers (8). In August 1976 the 40 m-long inlet channel from the Sunkosi river was destroyed by floods after torrential rain. This damage was restored in a month's time (9).

2. Overhead Transmission Line I

Its course is from Sunkosi to Kathmandu (1). Construction started at the end of 1968 (2).

D Agricultural Projects

1. Pokhara Water Control and Irrigation Project

A protocol relating to this project was signed in July 1976 (1). Construction started in November 1981. The project is composed of two parts - an irrigation system including an 80 metre-long and 4 metre-high dam, a 7.8 kilometrelong canal, 26 branch canals and a number of aqueducts and sluices; and a small power station with a generating capacity of 1500 kW. Upon its completion, the project can provide irrigation for 750 hectares of farmland and electricity for Pokhara - a fast tourismdeveloping city in the country (2) On completion of the project, 1,200 ha of land in the suburbs of Pokhara will be irrigated. This project is expected to help the tourist industry, create employment opportunities, and develop small industries in the area, in addition to increasing agricultural production. 2. Sunsari - Morang Irrigation Project

1976; cit. SWB/W 886.

A contract relating to this project was signed in December 1982. Located in the border district of Morang, southeast of Nepal, the project is a comparatively large one to be undertaken by China in the form of tender. The initial-stage construction, with a designed irrigated area of 11,200 hectares of land, will cost some 14.50 million US\$. China has participated in the international tenders for Nepal's various projects since early this year. Before China entered into two other this, bonds with Nepal in the same mode of tender for providing Nepal with equipment for five small hydropower stations and for undertaking the power trans-mission project for the construction of the Marsyandi hydropower station (1). The project, expected to be completed in 1986, is at the contract price of 14.5 million US\$ to be financed from a loan from the World Bank. The project was initially completed by India in the early 1970s, but later it became ineffective due to serious silting and blockage in the irrigation channels and lack of maintenance of the structures (2).

3. Farming Research

The Parbanipur agricultural station, a multiple-agricultural research institution situated over 160 km south of Kathmandu, introduced a fine strain of lemon from China. Under the care of this station, fine-strain lemons have grown and multiplied on Nepalese soil and become acclimatized to local conditions and resistant to diseases. In 1976, the station was also popularizing Beijing ducks, which have become acclimatized to the Nepalese environment and fattened rapidly (1). 1) XNA, Oct 17, 1976.

1. Warehouse I

A warehouse with a floor space of 7,000 square meters was built in Kathmandu. Construction started in October 1965 (1) and was completed in September 1967 (2). 1) XNA, Feb 1966; 2) XNA, Sep 27, 1967.

According to one contract signed between the China National Postal and Telecommunications Industry Corporation and the Bell Telephone Manufacturing Company S.A. and Belgian Funds voor Ontwikkelingssamenwerking, a joint venture will be set up in Shanghai to manufacture s1240 stored control digital telephone switching system and special integrated circuits needed for the system. The joint venture will sell its products on both the Chinese and world markets. The term of the contract is set at 15 years. The s1240 stored control digital telephone exchange equipment is used in urban telephone exchange system to ease the tense situation involved in the use of urban telephones, improve the service and ensure the telephone's fidelity, thus helping digitalize future telecommunication networks. According to the other contract for the direct supply of s1240 stored control digital telephone exchange equipment, the Belgian side

will provide to China 52,000 lines of local telephone exchange equipment and 400 international trunks for gateway exchange equipment. During the period covered by the contract, the Bell Telephone Manufacturing Company S.A. will send engineers and technicians to China to help install, test and check equipment, in addition to train-ing Chinese personnel.
